

Previous examination papers and memos may also provide the latest formats of different papers and how questions are formulated and answered. Practice the questions from different Papers and re-do those that you got wrong, making sure that you have practiced the right type of questions.

Based on evidence from research, a full night's sleep is necessary before the day of examinations as the brain needs time to digest the material studied. Read the summarized notes at least two hours before the examination session to refresh your memory.




